We have a wonderful program in store for you. Our first guest is **Lorraine Theresa**. Here is her biography, in her own words: Lorraine Theresa has an intense passion for music, evident in her perceptive phrasing and tone, both as an instrumentalist and vocalist. With a weighty voice

and sensitive execution on the Classical Guitar, Lorraine Theresa derives pure pleasure when interpreting the works of great Latin American and Western European composers. Inspired by the likes of John Williams, Andres Segovia, and Berta Rojas, Lorraine Theresa has equal admiration for the great female jazz song stylists who have inspired her to sing selections from the great American Songbook, particularly Sarah Vaughan and Dinah Washington.

We will also be welcoming **Tracey Quezada** who is the recipient of an AAUW Fellowship and is studying at UC Berkeley. She is a Latina documentary filmmaker and editor with 15 years of experience. Quezada recently edited a feature produced by KQED that premiered in March 2020 titled <u>Dear Homeland</u>. She edited and directed documentaries that address



the school-to-prison pipeline, immigration and LGBTQ issues. She currently owns and operates a full-service media production company.

Quezada was recognized by the San Francisco International Film Festival for her achievement in media and activism. Her current film is When You Were Young, which deals with sexual abuse of children.

### **Shannon Master**

Shannon received a \$2000 scholarship from the San Diego branch this fall to attend UCSD as a junior. She is studying English and attending classes virtually. Her life has taken many paths which included moving 21 times before she was 17 years old because she was homeless, as well as spending time in jail and in rehab. At the age of 18 she decided to pursue an AS degree at Grossmont College. After 24 years of college classes at Grossmont College, she graduated with an AS degree in Math and Natural Sciences in 2019 and an AA degree in English in 2020. Shannon credits her media communications instructor in influencing her to write television productions. She became a producer and writer of live events, marketed projects for Comedy Central, Netflix, HBO, The History Channel, and Spike TV among others. Her career took her to 17 countries across North America, Europe, Asia and Australia. Shannon is proud of her Emmy Award for Outstanding



Achievement in Documentary TV Series for The Purple Couch in 2007 and Bigger Boxes: The Battle Over America's Superstores in 2004. She is thankful to the San Diego AAUW members for her scholarship so she can continue her studies at UCSD, care for her children and husband and stay safe.


