President's Message

February is Black History Month and March is Women's History Month, so let us remember Shirley Chisholm, who was the first African American woman to serve in Congress, beginning in 1968, and who was the first woman to seek the presidential nomination from a major political party in 1972. She came from humble beginnings but ended up graduating from Brooklyn College cum laude in 1946. Her motto and the title of the book she wrote was UNBOSSSED AND UNBOUGHT.

In Congress, she authored more than 50 pieces of legislation that championed the rights of women and the poor. She also fought racism and worked to end the Viet Nam War. During the 1972 presidential campaign, she was blocked from appearing at the debates on TV and was allowed to give only one speech. She continued in spite of the odds and eventually gained 10% of the delegates during the Democratic convention. Chisholm was also a co-founder of the National Women's Political Caucus in 1971. We could certainly use more women like Shirley Chisholm in Congress today!

Women's Liberation Movement: Second Wave

As we begin Women's History Month, we pay homage to the founders and promoters of the second wave of feminism, beginning with Betty Friedan's *The Feminine Mystic* (1963), and ending with the outcome of the National Women's Conference in 1977 when 2,005 women delegates voted on 26 planks designed "To Form a More Perfect Union." As a whole, the Second Wave can be characterized by a general feeling of solidarity among women fighting for equality. It also saw the creation of several types of feminism, such as radical, "womanist," liberal, visionary, and curious.

She then completed her M.A. in Multi-Cultural Education at Pepperdine University. She spent her career as a teacher, a resource teacher, a vice-principal, and a principal, and she continues working as interim principal and vice-principal upon occasion.

Public Policy News from National

On February 2, 2021, my co-chair Sue Miller and I met via Zoom with AAUW Public Policy Director Kate Nielsen and her assistant Robin Lucas, along with state public policy chairs across the nation, to get updates on changes to the public policy landscape with a new administration and Congress. Here is a summary of what we thought members would like to know:

1. AAUW Public Policy team sends notice of our priorities for the new year
 - a. Letter to the President, focused on
 - i. Women's Economic Security
 - ii. Education Access
 - b. Letter to 117th Congress
 - i. Passing the Paycheck Fairness Act
 - ii. Passing the Equity in Education Act
 - c. Both found at [aauw.org/resources/policy/documents](https://www.aauw.org/resources/policy/documents)
2. Also outlined Admin and Congressional Priorities
 - a. Biden-Harris in the 1st 2 weeks – 41 Exec orders
 - i. Covid, including student-debt relief and opening of schools
 - ii. Anti-discrimination, including removing barriers, DACA relief and a Task Force to reunite families
 - iii. Protecting women's health at home and abroad, including access to abortions
 - b. Coming Legislation from Congress
 - i. Covid relief – 1.9 Trillion package
 1. Paid sick & family leave extended thru Sept (14 weeks)
 2. Increase min wage to \$15
 3. Assistance to those at risk of losing jobs &/or their homes
 4. \$3B to help women with food relief for their families
 5. \$25B emergency fund for child care providers
 - ii. Raise the Wage Act (\$15 by 2025) – reintroduced Thursday
 - iii. FAMILY Act (emphasis on access to paid leave) – end of this week
 - iv. Paycheck Fairness Act – HR7
 1. AAUW working on since 1997
 2. Reintroduced 2/1
 3. Strong bi-partisan support
 4. Prohibits retaliation for discussing pay
 5. Closes loopholes in Equal Pay Act
 6. Can't use prior salary HX in hiring decisions
